Young Adult Book Recommendations Julia T., Grade 7 Mansfield Middle School

If you have read and liked the <u>Harry Potter</u> series by J. K. Rowling, you will probably also like:

Unwanteds series, by Lisa Mann

The Unwanteds series takes place in a land called Quill, a dark and dreary place, especially because every year, every twelve-year-old gets sorted into three categories: Wanted, Necessary, and Unwanted. And every year, the Unwanted children are sent off to their deaths. Alex and Aaron Stowe, identical twins, are destined to be wanted or necessary. But when the day of the purge comes, Aaron is sorted into 'wanted' and Alex is sorted into 'unwanted.' Alex and the other Unwanteds are sent off to what is supposed to be their deaths, but it turns out that everything they have been taught is a lie when they are lead into a magical land called Artime. Alex has to find a way to keep Artime hidden from Quill. This series relates to Harry Potter in the sense that a young boy is told that he is special and sent to a place of magic to train. It is full of adventure and a great read.

The Lunar Chronicles, by Marissa Meyer

The Lunar Chronicles is a series of futuristic fairy tales. In the first book, Cinder, the main character, is a gifted mechanic and also secretly a cyborg (part human, part robot). Earth is suffering from the plague, also known as Letumosis, and when Cinder's young stepsister becomes ill, Cinder will go to any length to save her. But then, The Lunars who live on the moon become mixed into the story; Cinder is told that she might be Lunar, that she might even be the only heir to the Lunar throne and, incidentally, the person that the Lunar queen wants dead most. This series relates to Harry Potter because Cinder's parents also died, leaving her with her stepmother,

who hates her.

Fablehaven, by Brandon Mull

When Kendra and Seth's parents go on a cruise, the kids go to stay with their grandparents. Their Grandpa warns them to stay out of the woods that surround the property because they are dangerous, but Seth does not listen. In the woods, he meets a witch named Muriel. Meanwhile, Kendra follows clues to a note that says 'drink the milk.' She and Seth both drink the milk put out for the animals and suddenly, they can see all the magical creatures around the garden. In doing this, they uncover the true nature of Fablehaven... This book series is like Harry Potter because of the magic aspect. (it's also like Alice in Wonderland)

The Tuesdays in the Castle series, by Jessica Day George

In the first book of this series, the main character is Princess Celie of Castle Glower, but while Celie might carry the title 'princess', she isn't your everyday princess. She's the kind with a castle that moves its rooms around depending on how it feels, who hates wearing dresses, who has devoted her life to mapping out her ever-changing castle. But when Celie's parents never come back from their journey to watch her oldest brother, Bran, graduate from the college of wizardry, and Celie's 13 year old brother, Rolf, is crowned the new king, when the castle is overtaken with the evil prince Kelsh and his soldiers, Celie and her siblings must get rid of Kelsh. This series relates to Harry Potter because of the magic aspect, because the castle moves, and because the protagonist has to get on without her parents.

The Spy School series, by Stuart Gibbs

When a full-fledged spy waltzes right into Ben Ripley's house and tells Ben that he's been picked to go to a top secret spy school, Ben is understandably shocked. And he's even more shocked when he enters spy school and meets Erica, a 13 year old girl who is one of the most capable spies at the school. When someone tries to kill

Ben, it's up to Ben and Erica to save spy school - and themselves. This book relates to Harry Potter because the main character finds themselves in a secret world unknown to anyone than the other kids there.


We will fulfill that promise on May 21st when we host Ken

It also includes an adjacent vacant lot with dozens of discount books wheeled out on carts most days, weather permitting. If you've never been, you'll be delighted by the huge selection and the eclectic setting as well as the first editions, antiquarian books, 19th century maps and any number of interesting items. It's a wonderful combination of bookstore and museum that's easy to find and well worth the visit.

But if you can't get to the shop, never fear we will bring it to you; at least the most mobile part of the store, its proprietor Ken Gloss. Mr. Gloss' knowledge and expertise are well known throughout the country; he may be familiar to you from his frequent appearances as an appraiser on PBS's "Antiques Roadshow."

Mr. Gloss will regale us with fascinating and amusing stories drawn from his lifelong experiences with appraising and selling books and related materials. As a bonus, he will offer appraisals of up to three books per person.

The program will be held at 6:00pm on Tuesday, May 21st in the Buchanan Auditorium at the library. Admission is free for paid-up members and \$10 for non-members. Refreshments will be provided.

From the Treasurer

The passing of another dear friend of the library this January got me thinking about the group of people who, in 1973, joined together to establish the Friends of the Mansfield Library. In looking through old minutes I see familiar names, and am grateful for their foresight in creating an organization with the mission of maintaining an "association of persons interested in good library service and in books; to increase the facilities and services of the Mansfield Library and thus to enrich the cultural opportunities available to the citizens of Mansfield and the surrounding area." Over the years, the Friends have amply supported the Mansfield Public Library, primarily through book sales. The earliest record I could find of their fundraising was \$31.95 in 1973. Hardcover books cost 40 cents or 3 for \$1.00, with paperbacks costing 15 cents or 10 for \$1.00. Since then, Friends booksales, two or three or sometimes four a year, have raised over \$600,000, most of which has been given to the library to buy books and pay for programs. To those who came before and to all of you still working to support the Friends, I say a sincere Thank You!
