

Book Review

Voyage of the Morning Light by Marina Endicott

"The Voyage of the Morning Light" is a "coming of age" novel about the relationship between two sisters and their opposing views about assimilation of non-English speaking people into a dominant culture. Set in 1911 in Nova Scotia, the novel describes a voyage that is both literal and figurative.

A teenage Kay accompanies her older sister Thea and her new husband, the captain of "The Morning Light," on a transoceanic trip with a cargo of trade goods to sell. At first Kay is enchanted by the wonders the sea presents. She gains self confidence as she studies Greek with her tutor who is a missionary bound for the South Seas. But Thea struggles through the voyage. When she miscarries a second time, Thea decides to buy a young Micronesian boy and raise him as her son. After they return to Nova Scotia, the child, Aren, discovers that he doesn't "fit in." Kay is haunted not only by Aren's unhappiness but also the tragic history of her father's school for indigenous children in Canada. (Most of his students died of maltreatment and disease.) The second half of the book picks up the story many years later. Kay, now a young woman, decides that a troubled Aren should return to Micronesia to find his parents and perhaps a home where he belongs. Without telling Thea, the two embark on another world voyage. You'll need to read this beautifully written novel to discover what happens and ponder the choices the sisters have each made. The reader can experience a wide range of emotions from joy to sorrow as the story unfolds.

Marie Endicott has based her story on her piano teacher's experience with adoption. This gives the novel a certain historic validity and a lens through which the reader can examine whether good intentions might have both unforeseen and unfortunate consequences. – *Susan Meisler*

Help Needed for the Book Sale

We always have a small of group of dedicated volunteers who regularly help set up each sale. We appreciate them immensely and couldn't do it without them and the experience they bring. For this sale we are hoping other members who haven't helped out before will join our regulars. It's actually a fun half-day of sorting through thousands of books. We will be setting up the sale on Friday, March 24th. There is a program in the auditorium in the morning so we will be starting at 1pm and will need all the help we can get in order to finish by 5pm. if you can spare some time that day to help we'd love to have some new faces (and hands). No lifting is required, but if you are able to lift we will certainly take advantage of that! Anyone who volunteers can purchase up to 10 books that day.

We also need help cleaning up after the sale at 3pm on Sunday. This is a much faster process and usually takes about an hour if we have a lot of help. This also does not require lifting unless you are able.

Cashiers are needed on both days. We schedule 4- hour shifts with 2 people at each of 2 stations, so you never have to work alone. No experience is necessary and all books are priced at 50 cents or \$1.00 or multiples thereof so no complex math is required.
